Geologic Resources Inventory

GIS Data Explanation, May 12, 2021

Geologic-Geographic Information Systems (GIS) data related to Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area is delivered in data package Zip (.zip) files. These data are a product of the NPS Geologic Resources Inventory (GRI) program, which is funded by the Inventory and Monitoring (I&M) Division and administered by the NPS Geologic Resources Division (GRD).

Geologic-GIS data for Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area consist of a dedicated park map providing complete coverage of the park and surrounding area, as well as individual component maps. Data files for the dedicated park map are named using the park four-letter code (BISO) as a prefix. Component maps are identified by the following prefixes: BART – Barthell Quadrangle and parts of the Oneida North Quadrangle, BASW – parts of the Barthell SW Quadrangle, BEFA – Bell Farm Quadrangle and parts of the Barthell SW Quadrangle, BURR – Burrville Quadrangle, HYCK – Honey Creek Quadrangle, NEVE – Nevelsville Quadrangle, ONNO – parts of the Oneida North Quadrangle, ONSO – Oneida South Quadrangle, RUGB – Rugby Quadrangle, SHPL – parts of the Sharp Place Quadrangle, and STOC – Stockton Quadrangle

Geologic-GIS data are provided in the following GRI-supported GIS data formats 1.) ESRI file geodatabase format, 2.) 2.2 KML/KMZ format for use with Google Earth software, 3.) Open Geospatial Consortium (OGC) geopackage format for use in QGIS (or other OGC software), and upon request in 4.) ESRI shapefile format (contact Stephanie O’Meara, see contact information below, to acquire shapefile format data).

Data package Zip files containing the different GRI-supported GIS data formats are identified with following file suffixes: 1.) ESRI file geodatabase for use in ArcGIS Pro have a file suffix of "gdb_pro.zip", 2.) ESRI file geodatabase for use in ArcGIS ArcMap have a file suffix of "gdb.zip", 3.) KML data have a file suffix of "kml.zip", 4.) OGC geopackage data have a file suffix of "gpkg.zip", and if requested 5.) shapefile data have a file suffix of "shp.zip".

The ArcGIS Pro data package ZIP file has an ESRI file geodatabase and a Pro map (.mapx) file, as well as Pro layer (.lyrx) files. The ArcGIS ArcMap data package ZIP file has an ESRI file geodatabase, and a 10.1 map document (.mxd) file, as well as 10.1 layer (.lyr) files. Pro map (.mapx) files, ArcMap map document (.mxd) files and QGIS project (.qgz) files present GRI geologic data layers and GIS tables complete with data layer and table naming, symbology and feature labeling for viewing and data analysis. The Pro layer (.lyrx) and ArcMap layer (.lyr) files are provided so data layers can be added to a new or existing Pro map (.mapx) file or ArcMap map document (.mxd) file, respectively, with their associated layer naming, symbology and labeling. All data package ZIP files also contain a FGDC-compliant metadata file (in .txt format).

In addition to a data package ZIP file, three additional files comprise a GRI digital geologic-GIS map: 1.) this file (biso_geology_gis_readme.pdf), 2.) the map’s GRI ancillary map information document (.pdf) file (biso_geology.pdf), which contains geologic unit descriptions, as well as other ancillary map information and graphics from the source maps used by the GRI in the production of this park’s GRI digital geologic-GIS data, and 3.) a user-friendly FAQ PDF version of the metadata (e.g., biso_geology_metadata_faq.pdf).

For a GIS dataset, the GRI recommends extracting all map files from a data package to its own folder. This is particularly of importance for file geodatabase data packages as an associated Pro map file (.mapx) and related layer (.lyrx) files, or ArcMap map document (.mxd) and related ArcMap layers (.lyr) files, all have relative file paths set to their file geodatabase.

Detailed information concerning the source data used by the GRI is listed in the Source Citation sections(s) of the included map metadata record (e.g., biso_geology_metadata.txt). This information is also available in the FAQ version of the metadata (e.g., biso_geology_metadata_faq.pdf). Information concerning source data is also in the Source Map Information GIS table (bisomap) and repeated in the GRI ancillary map information document (.pdf) file.

The Google Earth KMZ file, biso_geology.kmz, contains a limited version of the full spatial dataset (limited features and symbology). Google Earth software is available for free at: <https://www.google.com/earth/versions/>. The KMZ file possesses on-line links to the GRI program and its products, as well as to this readme document (on-line version), the GRI ancillary map information (.pdf) and the FGDC-compliant FAQ metadata (in .pdf format) pertaining to this dataset. Users are encouraged to open the readme document, FAQ metadata and the ancillary map information document outside of Google Earth should accessing the on-line versions via Google Earth be an issue. Users can also download Google Chrome (free at: <http://www.google.com/chrome/>) to view these files should their default browser not open these files from Google Earth.

The OGC geopackage data can be accessed using QGIS software. The software is available for free at: <https://www.qgis.org/en/site/>. A QGIS Project (.qgz) file is included for the compiled park extent map. For an OGC geopackage and its QGIS project (.qgz) file, these files should also be kept together in the same folder. Some line and point feature symbology within the QGIS Project (.qgz) file is incomplete.

Users of this data are cautioned about the locational accuracy of features and should not assume that features are exactly where they portrayed in Google Earth, ArcGIS, QGIS or other software used to display the data. Refer to the positional accuracy report and use constraints within a map metadata record for additional information concerning the positional accuracy of features in a GRI dataset. Users are also encouraged to only use the Google Earth data for basic visualization, and not to use the GIS data for any type of data analysis or investigation.

For detailed information regarding GIS parameters such as data attribute field definitions, attribute field codes, value definitions, and rules that govern relationships found in the data, refer to the NPS Geology-GIS Data Model document, gri_gdb_ggdm_v2dot3.pdf (available at: <https://www.nps.gov/articles/gri-geodatabase-model.htm>).
